

## **Construction Case Study:**

Using video documentation in the construction industry grows more commonplace daily, with uses including progress reporting, remote viewing, insurance documentation and more. Here is just one example of how video saved a terrible and unjust lawsuit from being leveled against a contractor.

Company “X” had been scheduled to perform services on a building in Boston, where neighboring residences directly abutted the address in question. The scope of work required was to include some heavy jack hammering and digging to install helical piers in the basement of the building to correct structural issues.

Before beginning the work, the contractor visually inspected the foundation and those of the adjoining buildings. Cracks and other existing damages were evident, so he called Eugenetworks in to document it.
